

# HIDDENITE CENTER'S BARN QUILT PROJECT

**All directions are from the Hiddenite Center's Lucas Mansion!**

## **JAMES KING BARN**

Turn LEFT out of the Lucas Mansion drive and proceed to NC-90, then turn LEFT onto NC-90 and follow for 2.8 miles, then turn RIGHT onto Lentz Road and follow for .3 mile, then turn LEFT onto US 64 and follow for 9.4 miles, then turn LEFT to merge onto I-40 East via the ramp on the left and follow for 1.6 miles, take the NC 115 exit (EXIT 150), toward Statesville/Downtown/N Wilkesboro and follow for .2 mile, then turn LEFT onto NC 115/North Center Street and continue to follow NC 115 for 8.3 miles, turn RIGHT onto Snow Creek Road and follow for .2 miles. End at 1220 Snow Creek Road in Statesville, NC. The James King Barn is on the right.

The James King Barn was originally part of a land grant that has been in the King family for more than 200 years. Carolyn King Harrington is the current owner of the farm. The Barn features a block from "Flowering Vine" made by the Hager Family of the Central School Community of Iredell County (about one and one-half miles from this location). The quilt was made around 1890. The colors are all natural dyes. The quilt is currently owned by Phyllis Bailey.HARRINGTON BARN

**Go back to The Lucas Mansion and proceed to the Linney Barn ...**

## **LINNEY BARN**

Turn RIGHT out of the Lucas Mansion drive and proceed .2 mile to Sulphur Springs Road, then turn LEFT onto Sulphur Springs Road and continue to follow Sulphur Springs Road for 6.6 miles, then Sulphur Springs becomes NC 1001 (Linney's Mill Road), but you continue to follow it for 1.5 miles more. End at 7546 Sulphur Springs Road (going toward Linney's Mill). The Linney Barn is located on the left.

Linney Family Barn features one block from "Stepping Stones" or "Good Cheer." The quilt was made by Elsie Clark Linney within sight of this barn, c. 1915 in Alexander County. The quilt is currently owned by the maker's son, Gene Linney and family of Taylorsville.

**Head back to The Lucas Mansion on Sulphur Springs Road. Travel 4.2 miles to Sharpe's Mill Road ...**

## **WAYNE WOOTEN BARN**

Turn LEFT onto NC 1461 (Sharpe's Mill Road) and follow for .4 mile, then turn LEFT onto NC 1459 (Query Road) and follow for .8 mile. End at 969 Query Road in Hiddenite. The Wooten Barn is on the left.

Wayne Wooten Barn was originally known as the Query Family Farm, and it features one block of a quilt called "Grandmother's Choice" and was made by Ella Saunders Fowlkes, c. 1940 in Caswell County. The quilt is currently owned by the maker's grandson, Robert W. Duncan and family of Taylorsville.

**Turn around and come back to the Lucas Mansion.**

#### **LACKEY FARM/SINK NURSERY BARN**

Go past the Lucas Mansion drive and proceed across NC-90 and 64, and follow Old Mountain Road South for about 3.5 miles. The barn, a beige metal building, is on your right. The quilt is on the north end of the building.

The Lackey Farm/Sink Nursery Barn features a four-block section of "Eastern Star" made by Bessie Steele Burgess, c. 1920 in Alexander County. The quilt is currently owned by her daughter, Altha Mae Burgess Hendren Hall and family of Hiddenite.

**Turn around and go back up Old Mountain Road to Liberty Church Road, which is 1.7 miles back on your LEFT.**

#### **ROBERT L. ALLEN BARN**

Turn LEFT onto NC 1617 (Liberty Church Road) and follow for .2 mile, then turn LEFT onto Wellman Road and follow for 1.5 miles. At the Stop Sign, turn LEFT onto Mt. Wesley Church Road and follow 1.3 miles to Rector Road and turn LEFT onto Rector Road. The Allen Barn is located in front of you.

The Robert L. Allen Family Barn features one block of a quilt called "Turkey Tracks." The quilt was made by Mamie Lee Poarch Teague in 1965 in Alexander County. The quilt is owned by the maker's great-granddaughter Dinah Austin of Taylorsville.

**Go back to Mt. Wesley Church Rd., turn right onto Mt. Wesley, and follow to the Stop Sign. Turn right onto Millersville Rd. and go to the Traffic Light. Turn left onto US 64 and follow US 64 for 5 miles to NC Highway 16 South Exit ...**

#### **WADE M. AND ARLIE MOOSE WHITE (KAY BARON) BARN**

Turn LEFT onto NC 16 and follow it for 4 miles. End at 4771 NC Highway 16 South of Taylorsville. The Kay Baron Barn is located on the left, across the road from Alexander Trucking.

The Wade M. and Arlie Moose White (Kay Baron) Barn features one block from "Cross and Chains", c. 1920 from Indiana. The quilt was part of the collection of

Eileen Lackey Sharpe of Hiddenite, and the quilt is currently owned by Allison S. Houchins of Stony Point.

**Proceed .9 miles on 16 S. to the Traffic Light, located at the top of the hill. Turn right onto Friendship Ch. Rd. Travel .3 miles; turn left onto Wayside Ch. Rd.**

### **WILSON FRIDAY BARN**

Turn Right onto Rink Dam Road and follow for 1.7 miles, then turn LEFT onto Poly Bowman Road and follow for .5 mile (there is a sharp curve to the left – bear left). The Friday Barn is on the left at 681 Poly Bowman Road, located across from Espie Little Rd.

Wilson Friday Barn features a quilt “Eight-Pointed Star Flowers” and was made by Louisa Dacons Cass, c. 1890-1900, in Iredell County. The quilt currently is owned by the maker’s grandson, David Redmond and family of Statesville.

**Turn around at Espie Little Road and go back to the Traffic Light at Friendship Ch. Rd and Hwy 16. Turn Left onto Hwy 16, heading North and follow to the T intersection with NC 90 (Radio Shack is in front of you) ... Turn LEFT and proceed to the second traffic light (right after MacDonald’s) and turn RIGHT onto 16 North ...**

### **HARRINGTON APPLE HOUSE**

Follow NC-16 for 4.7 miles, then turn RIGHT onto Vashti Road and follow it for 2.2 miles, then turn RIGHT onto Black Oak Ridge Road and follow it for .9 mile, then turn LEFT (in a curve between the Church and the Cemetery) onto NC 1429 (Pleasant Hill Church Road) and follow it for .6 mile. You will end at 1231 Pleasant Hill Church Road in Taylorsville. The Harrington Apple House is on your left!

The Harrington Apple House was operated by the late Flake Harrington and features the center section of an original quilt design with 5,810 pieces, made by Salle Jane Edmiston Woodward, c. 1885, in Iredell County. The quilt is owned by a great-granddaughter, Ethel Mason Campbell and family of Statesville.

*To return to NC Hwy. 90 in Taylorsville follow Black Oak Ridge Rd. (Turning left at Pleasant Hill Church) until you reach stop sign at Linney’s Mountain Road. Turn left and next light will put you on NC Hwy. 90.*
